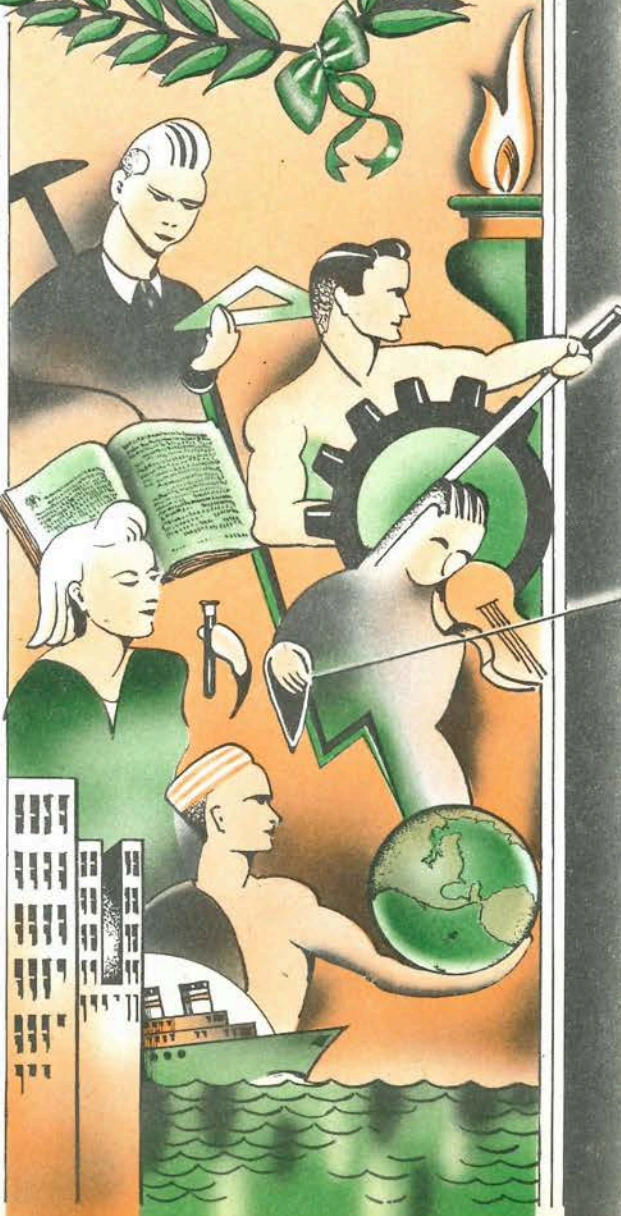
About mid-year Jim Morris left us and the President's duties were bestowed upon Lindsay.

The boys in Grades Six, Seven, and Eight served as Patrol Boys.

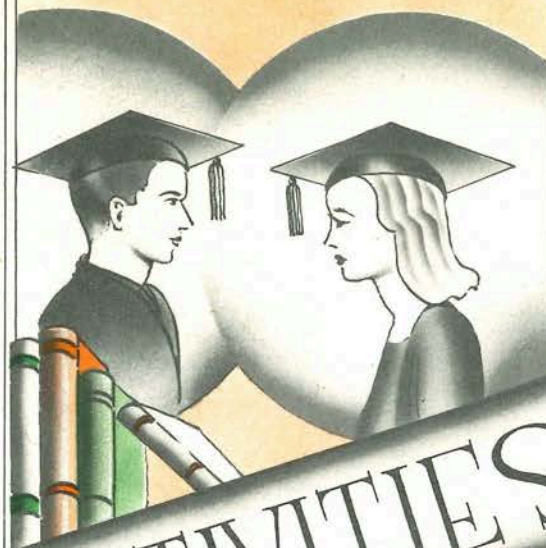

During the year a number of Educational Films have been shown which were enjoyed by all. Many of these pictures were financed by the various high school class groups and we wish to express our appreciation to them.

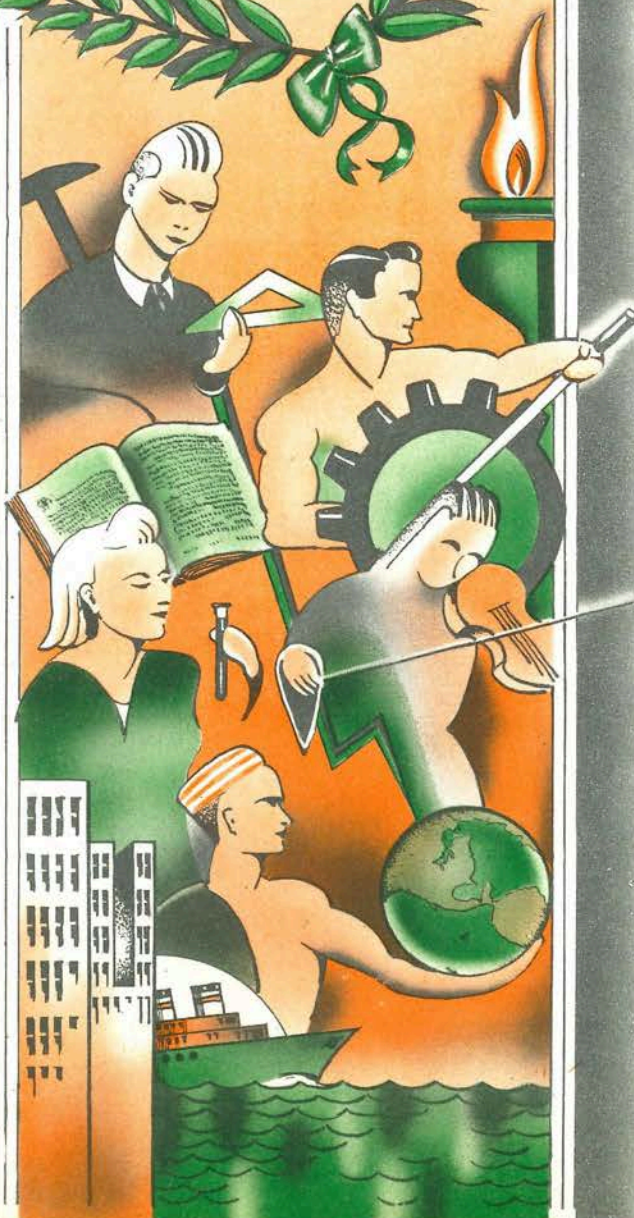

Joan soon forgives Bob for the "attempted murder" but her father Mr. Abernaker and the P. T. A. are not so quick too forgive and forget.

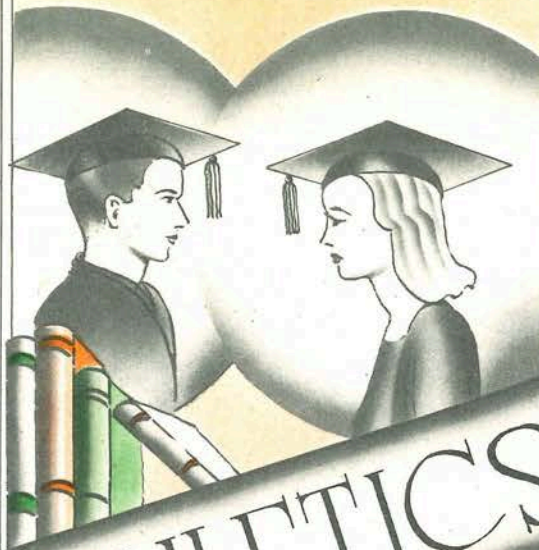
However, when the rabbits turn out to be something else and Mr. Abernaker forgives his "sort of future son-in-law" the clouds turn inside out to show a "silver lining."

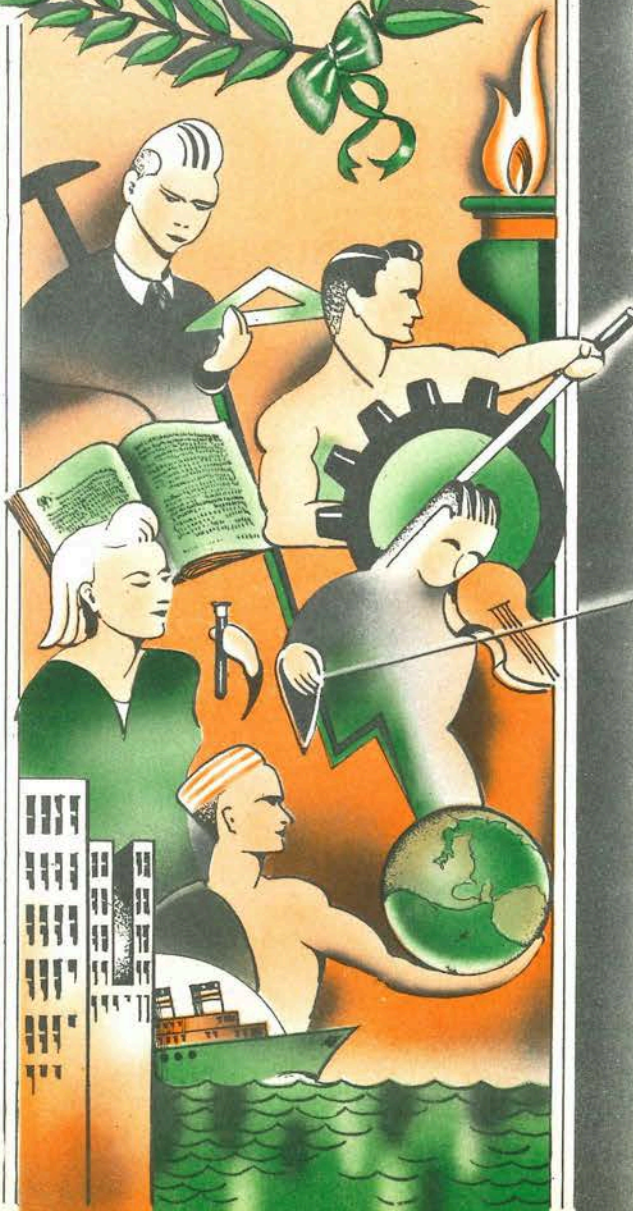

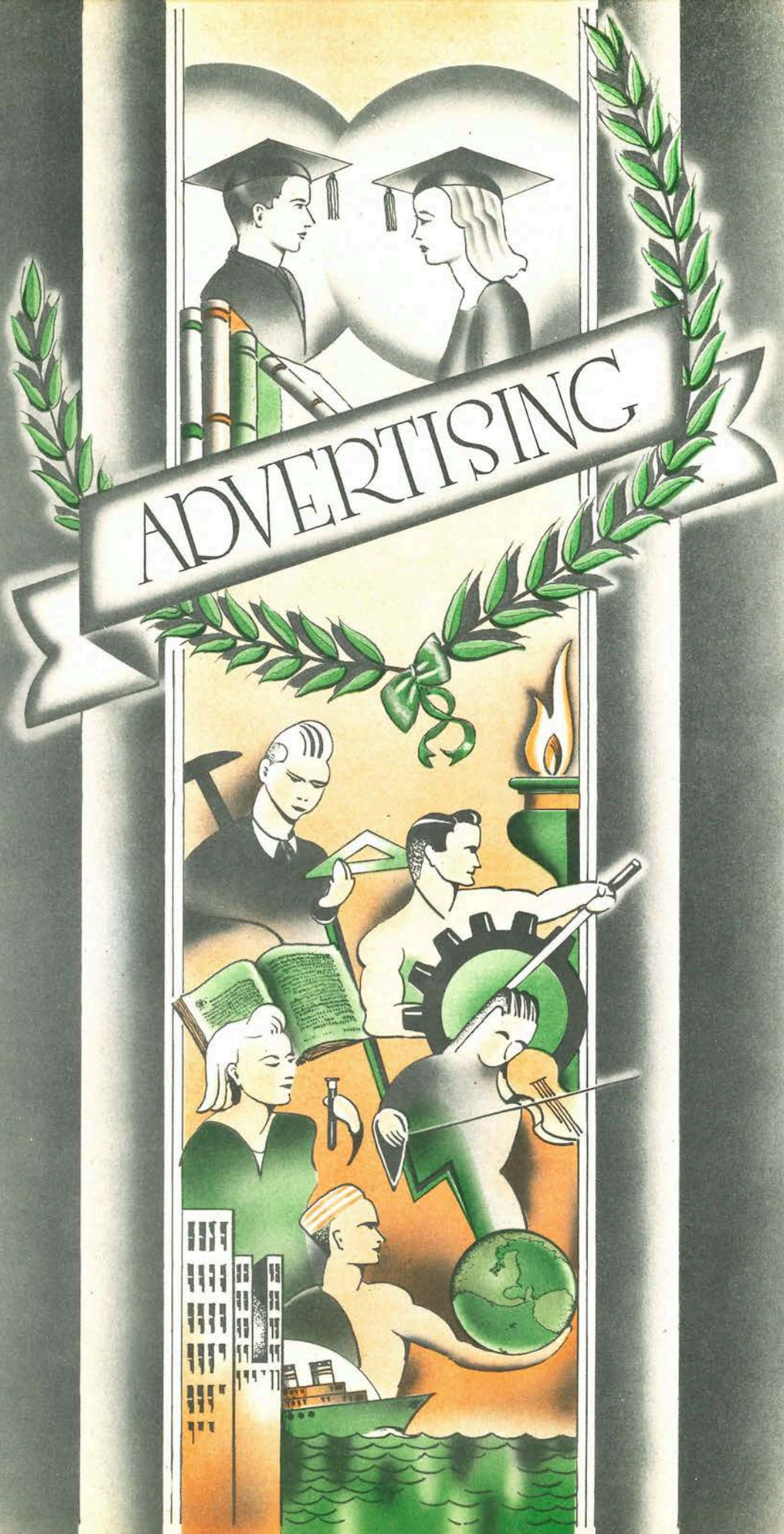
