





JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

magazine subscriptions during the contest.



For the past three years our class has been well represented in organizations around school. Those in particular are, both basketball






During the year a number of Educational Films have been shown which were enjoyed by all. Many of these pictures were financed by the various high school class groups and we wish to express our appreciation to them.
