
"Being a junior has been very challenging. You have plenty of school work to keep you busy, plus you have to start thinking about your future," shares Julie Vance.


"Being a Junior has been very very fun so far because I hardly ever have any homework, and being a Junior also gets you to start thinking about your future goals," Chloie Talley comments.





"I like being in eighth grade because it is my last year in junior high and next year I'll be in high school," expressed Mary Bueneman.




A New Beginning


"I was very excited to go to a different school and having more than one teacher all day," stated Paulette Dutton.

"Basketball was really rough this year but it was still fun. I'm glad coach was able to make it through this season, too. A lot of credit goes to coach."







son yet. I think we are all quite happy with the turn out. We worked hard as a team and, considering the lack of Varsity experience, we did very well," commented Amy Hill.












HOMECOMING
