


HISTORY OF THE WRIGHT CITY HIGH SCHOOL

The Wright City High School was established in the City Hall in 1922. Since then its progress has been the chief concern of the town and community. The school was begun as a two year high school, advancing to a three year high school in 1923. In 1930-31 it was recognized as a first class four year high school, and at this time its graduating class consisted of nineteen students.

With the addition of the new gymnasium in 1931 the school established a reputation for playing winning basketball. At this time there was only one trophy in the trophy case, and during the ensuing fourteen years one hundred and nine teen trophies were added. At the present, the one hundred and twenty trophies are on display in the trophy case at the

entrance of the school.

The addition of Home Economics in 1937 enabled the school to train girls to be better home makers. In 1943 they organized the Modern Miss Club which helps to create leadership.

The Music Department, during its first year produced a fine orchestra and in 1941 was converted to brass instruments

and is now recognized as the W. C. H. S. Band.

The Vocational Agriculture Department is another great It has made various improvements and has pro-

duced four State Farmers in the past three years.

In 1938 a thirty-five thousand dollar, fourteen room school building was constructed under the supervision of the W. P. A. A two thousand dollar bond issue was voted by Wright City for payment on the building. The bonds have been paid off and the school is free of debt.

In 1944 the Service Board was placed in the hall of the school upon which there now are one hundred and two names of


former students of Wright City High.

This year a movie projector with a sound track has been purchased by the Student Body. A class room screen and an auditorium screen was financed by the Alpha Club of Wright City and presented to the school.

Incidentally our band received a superior rating.

I thought the outstanding class event of the year was the initiation of the Freshmen. I remember, besides the funny garbs that the Freshmen wore, the horror that some of the girls expressed when they were blindfolded and told that a certain Sophomore boy was going to kiss them. Of course, they screamed and their faces turned rather pink when someone kissed them. I remember one girl in particular, who cried after she had been kissed. I think she was ashamed of herself after she found out that only a Sophomore girl had really kissed her.

During my Junior year, under the leadership of Gilbert Kreuger as class president and Mrs. Lichtenberg as class sponsor, we gave a "Mexican Prom" in honor of the Seniors. As chairman of the refreshment committee, I worked in the Home Ec. room all day. We made chicken salad sandwiches and fruit punch. Our sponsor was in the gym helping the others

to decorate, so we fixed the refreshments just as we wanted them. That evening we had a great deal of fun dancing to the music of the Club Royal orchestra, but I could not enjoy the refreshments. Even though we had worked so hard planning the From, I think we appreciated it much more than any other party.

Our Junior play was entitled "Special Delivery."

I've enjoyed my Senior year more than any other year. It seems as if everyone is more friendly and greets me with

a smile, even the teachers. I often wonder why.

The class officers who served this year were: Gilbert Kreuger, President; Eunice Paul, Vice President; Doris Thieman, Secretary; Mildred Hunn, Treasurer; Margie Fry and Emmet Brakensiek, Student Council members; Miss Clough, Sponsor.

Outstanding events of this year have been the arrival of our class rings, the Senior invitation party in December, the Senior play entitled "Growing Pains," and now looking

forward to Commencement.

Since I was a member of the Pep Squad, I attended the Wright City and Wentzville Basketball Tournaments. Seeing so many boys and girls of high school age made me feel as though I'd like to know each one of them. Of course, this was impossible, but I did enjoy talking to some of them. Some were glad to talk about their school life while others would reply with sarcastic remarks. Thus, I discovered that the reputation of a school is often based on the behavior and personalities of the students, when they are visiting other schools. Therefore, as I leave Wright City High, I shall always try to carry its cheerful and willing school spirit with me, wherever I may go. M.F.

Boys and Girls in Grades Six, Seven, and Eight served


as Patrol Boys and Girls.

Each member of the Staff has done his part in compiling the book and the Seniors are proud to have been able to have carried n this activity in these trying times.










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
