Getting Ready for the *Big Night*



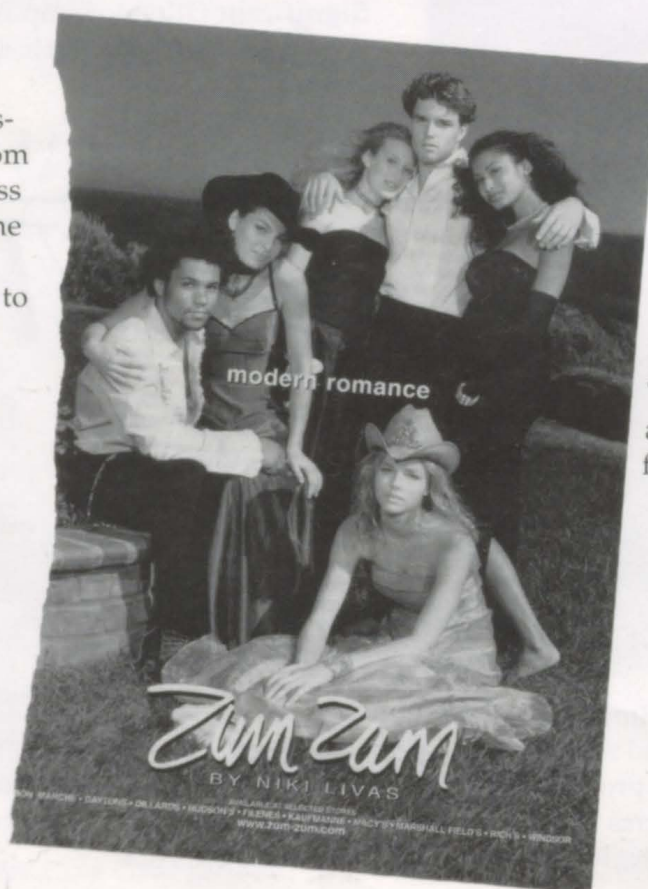
From the corsage to the shoes, getting ready for Prom is all about details, details, and nails. It's a tradition at almost

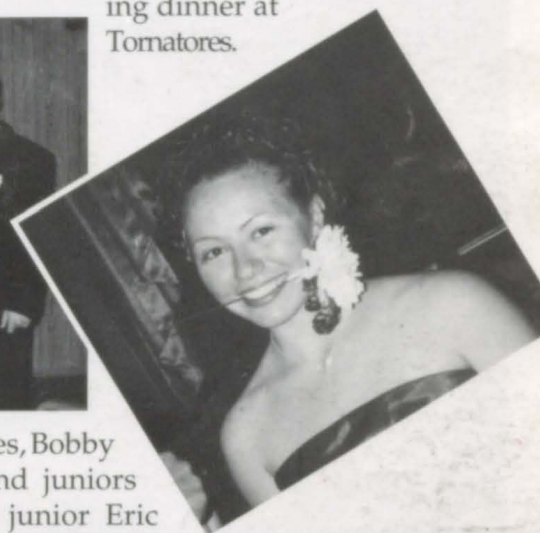

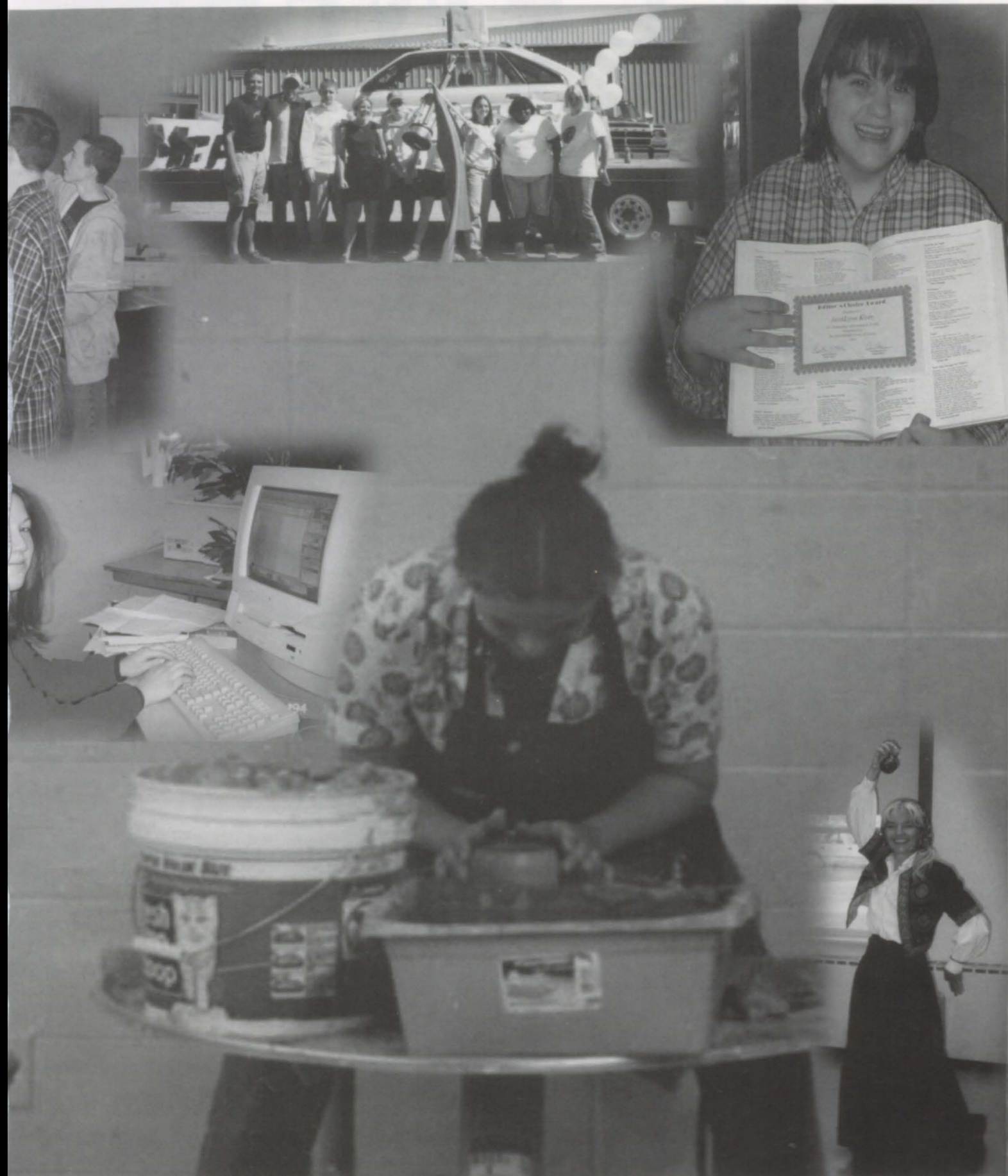

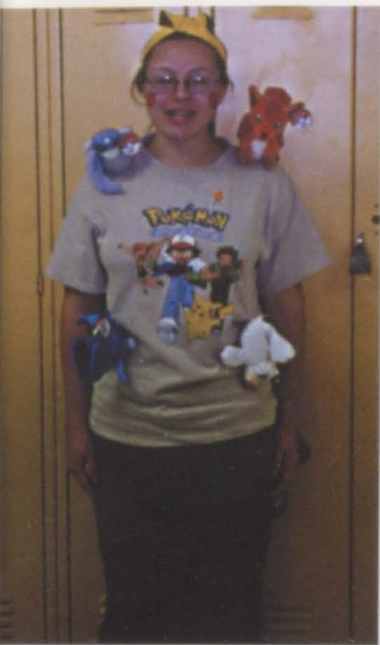

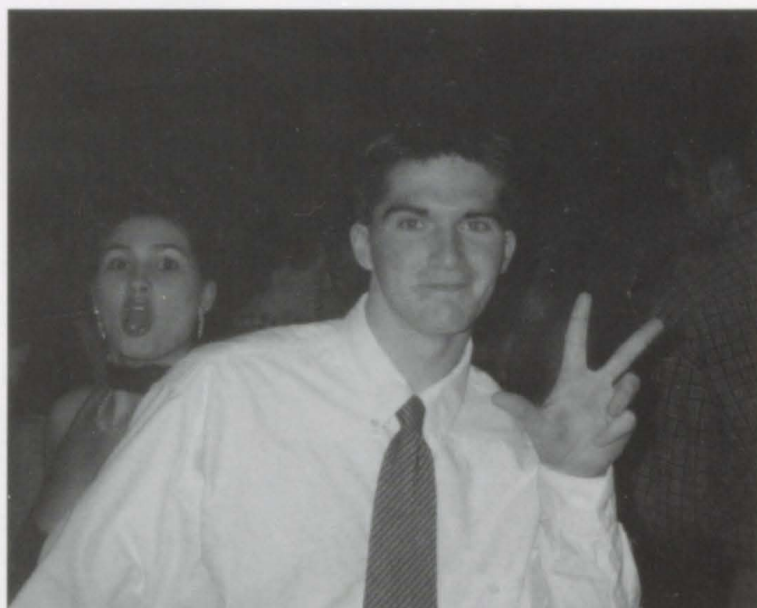

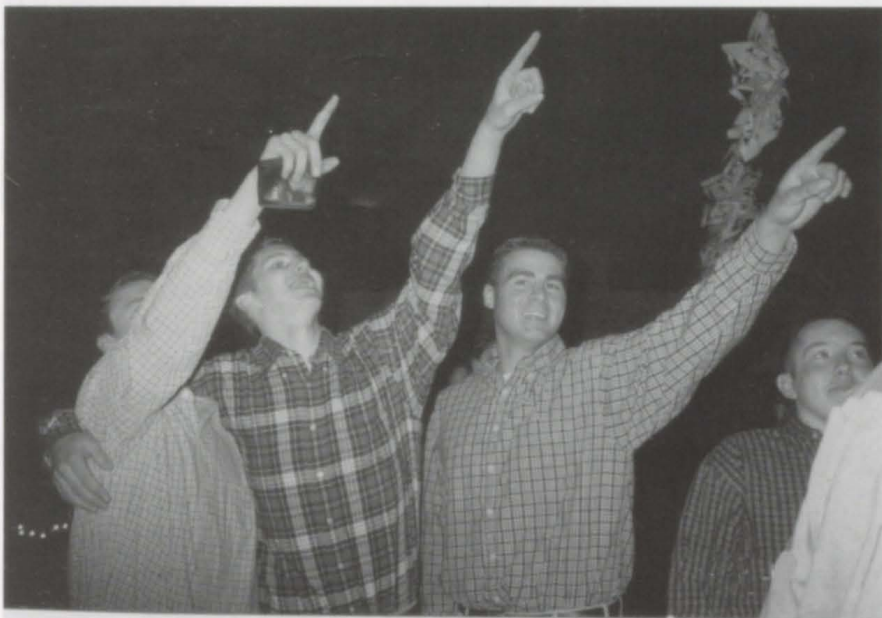

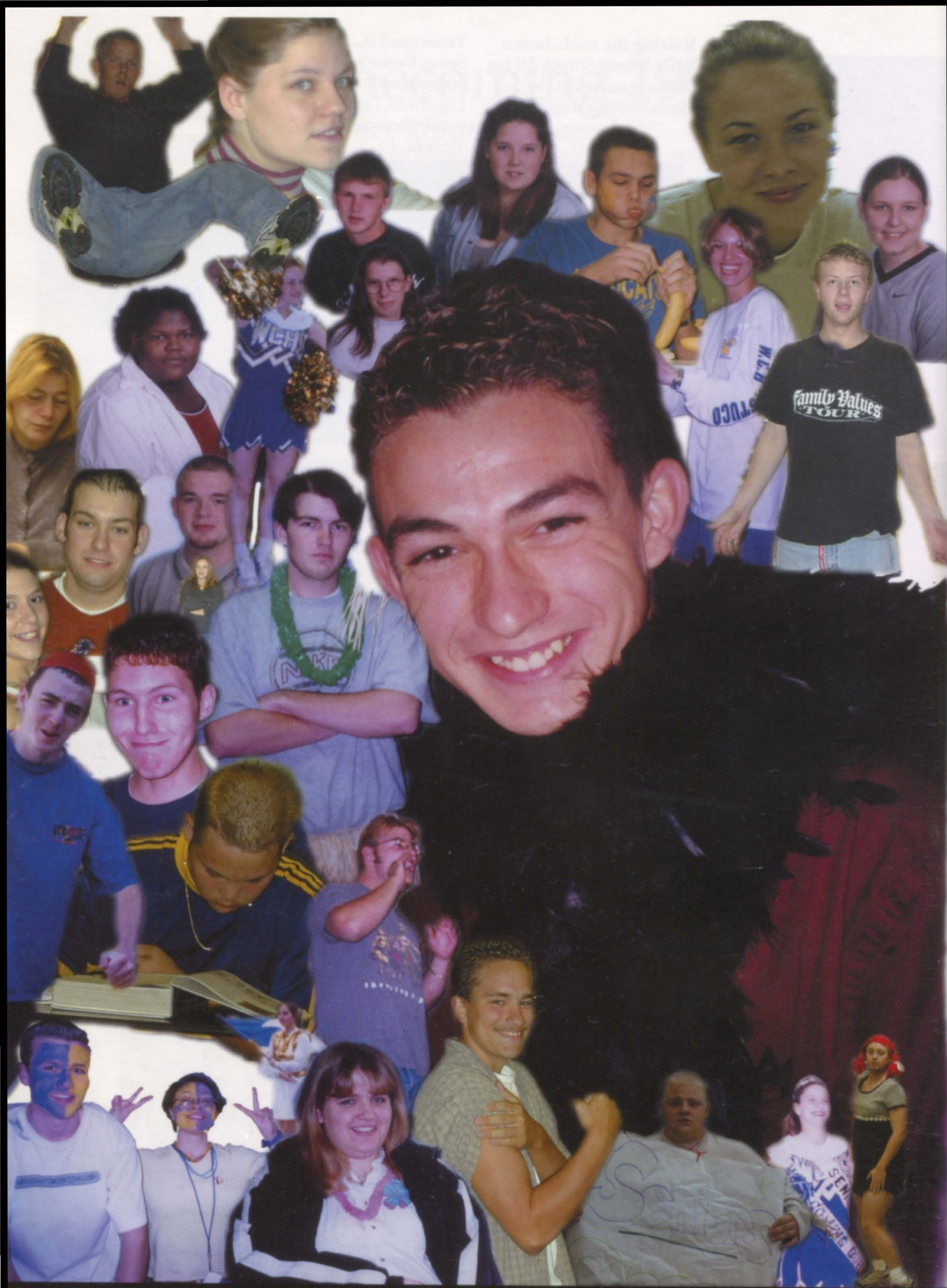

Some decisions may seem simple while others appear ominous, which we attempt to avoid altogether.

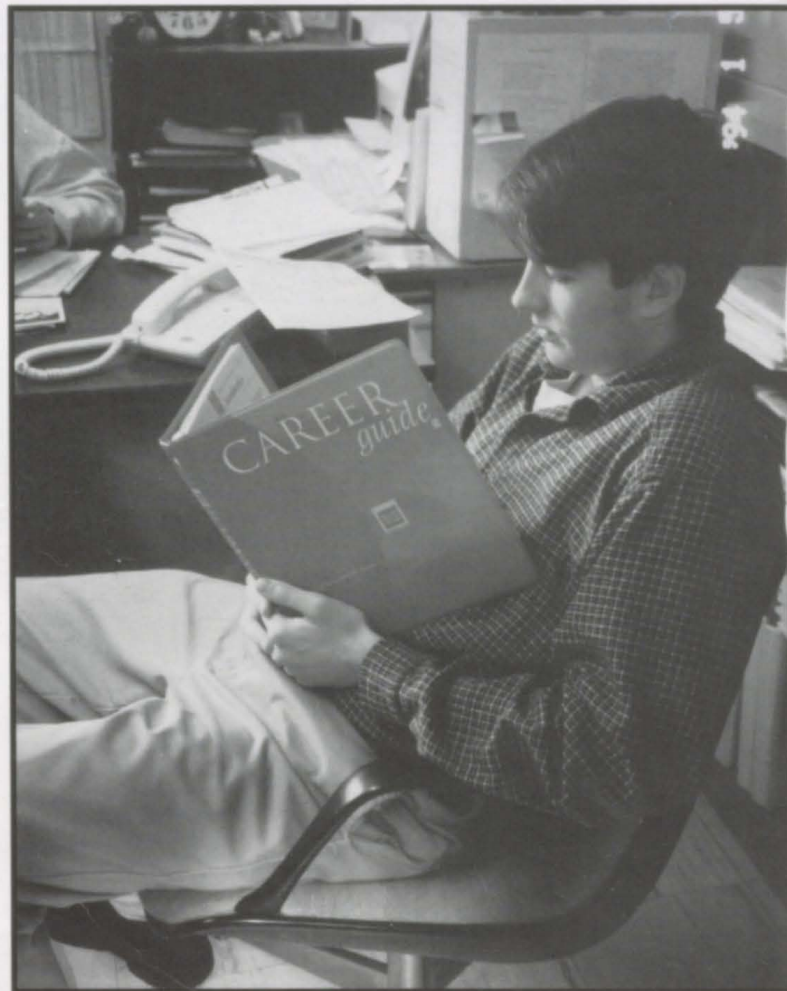
In the end, it all comes down to keeping yourself grounded and your eye on the goal.

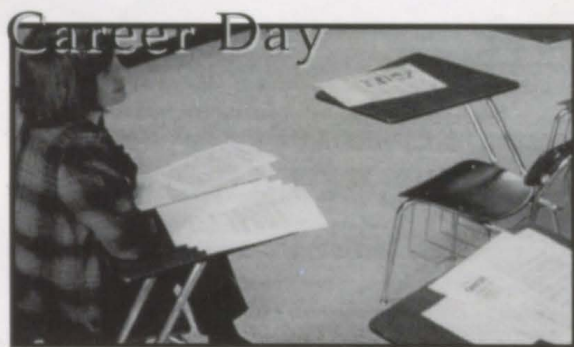

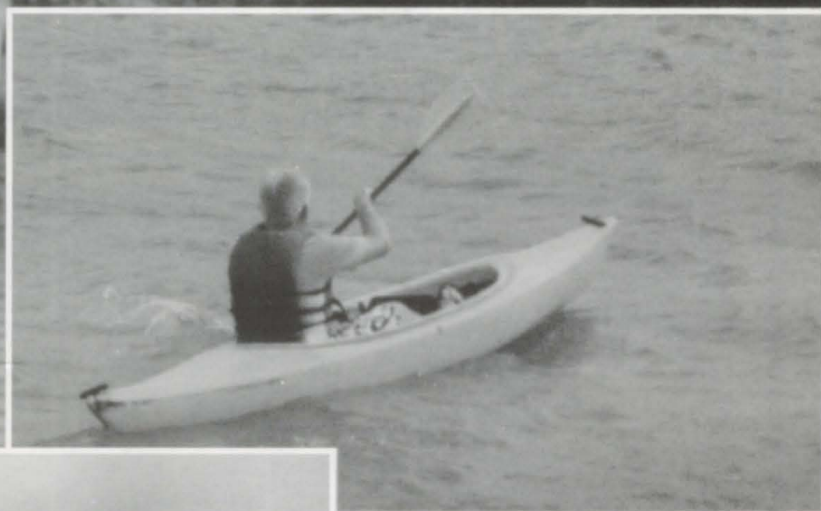

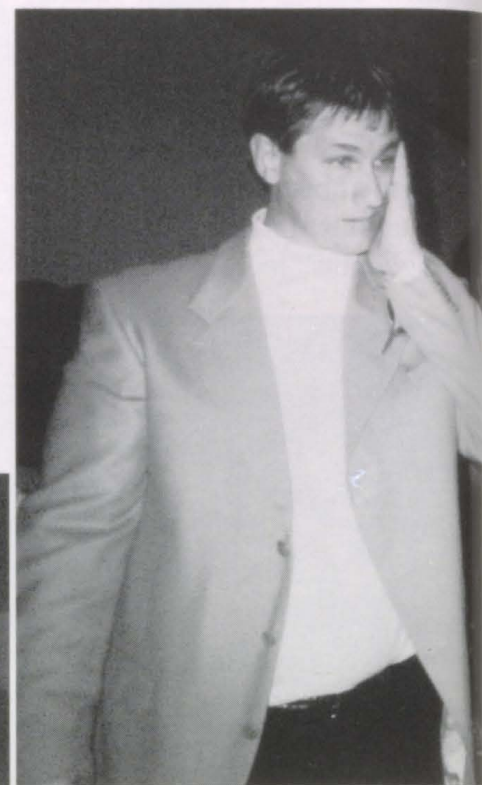
Diet was another change. The players were required to give up their cherished sodas and junk food, "to prepare their bodies for the long, hard season of basketball," said coach Fred Ross.

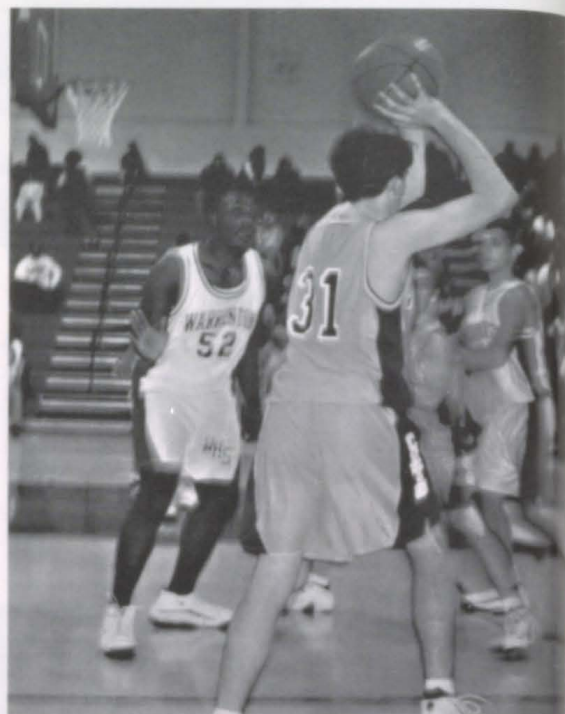

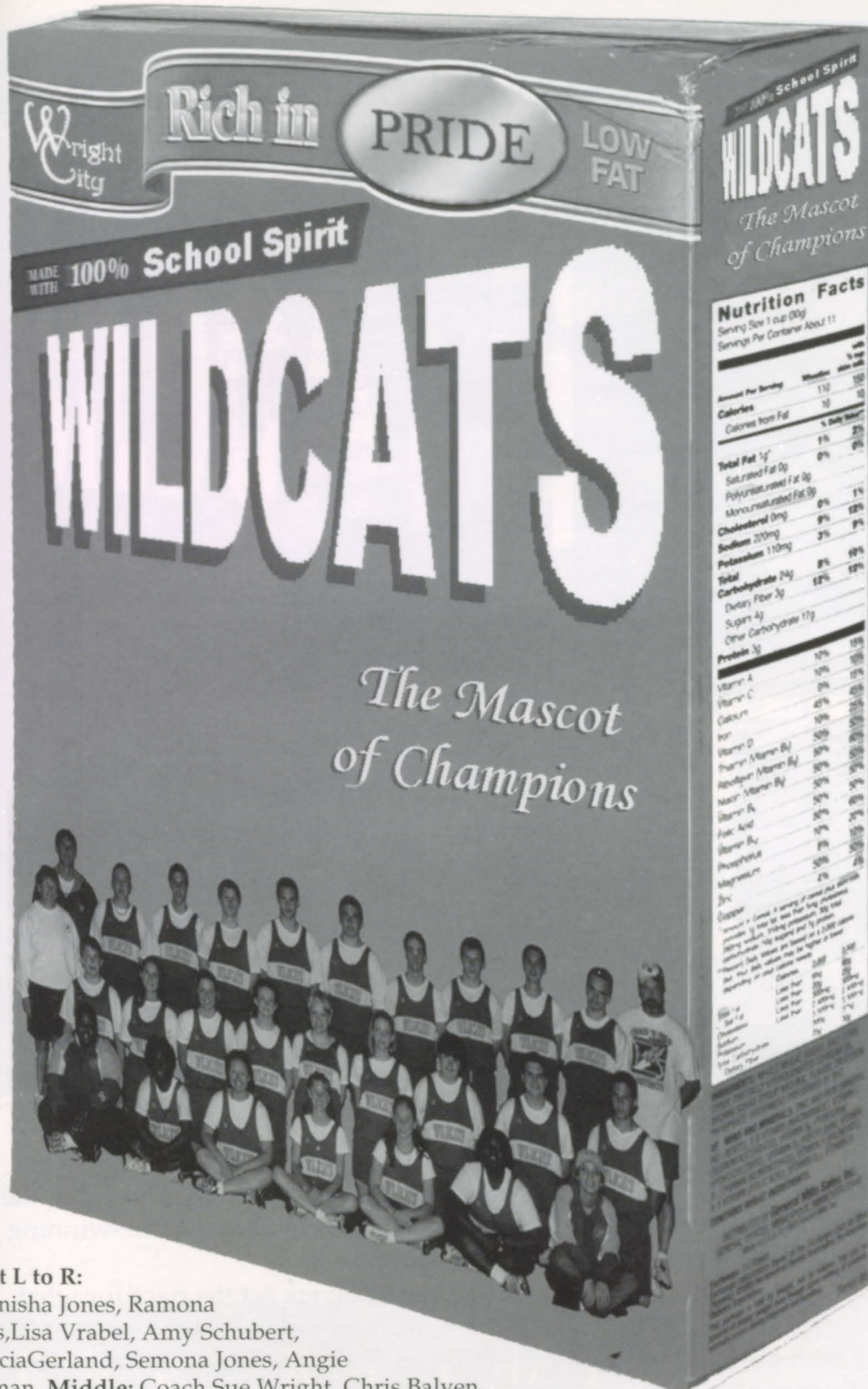

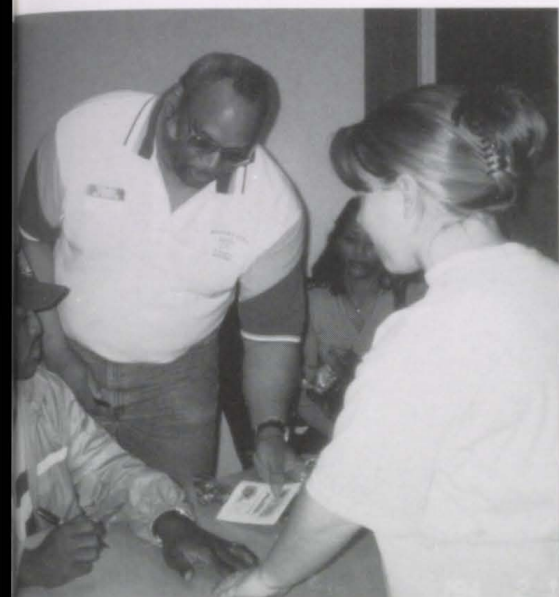

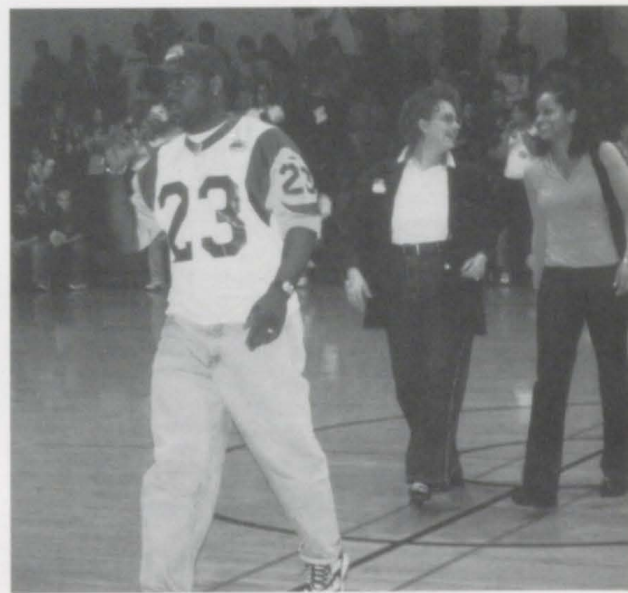

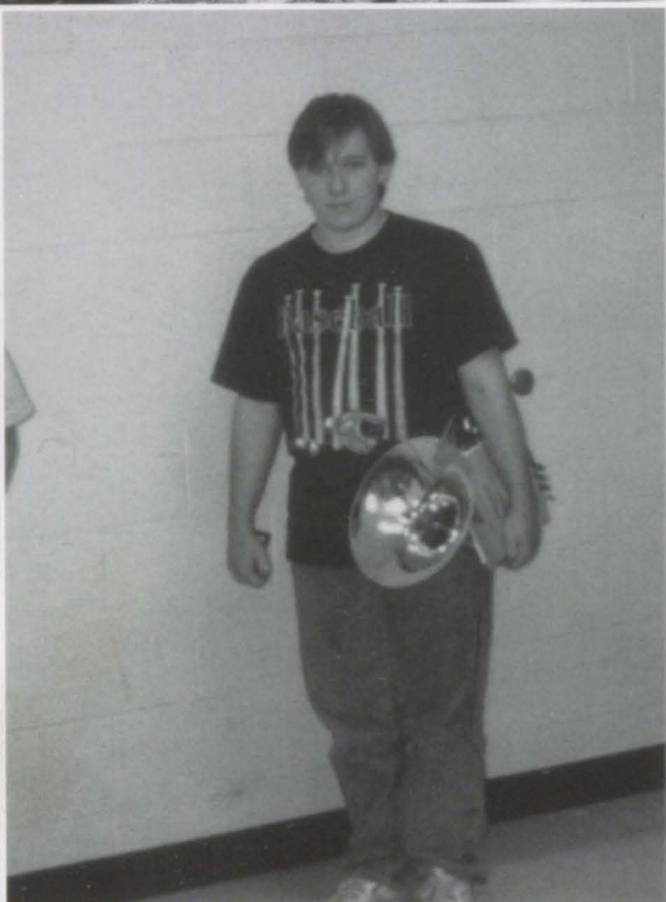

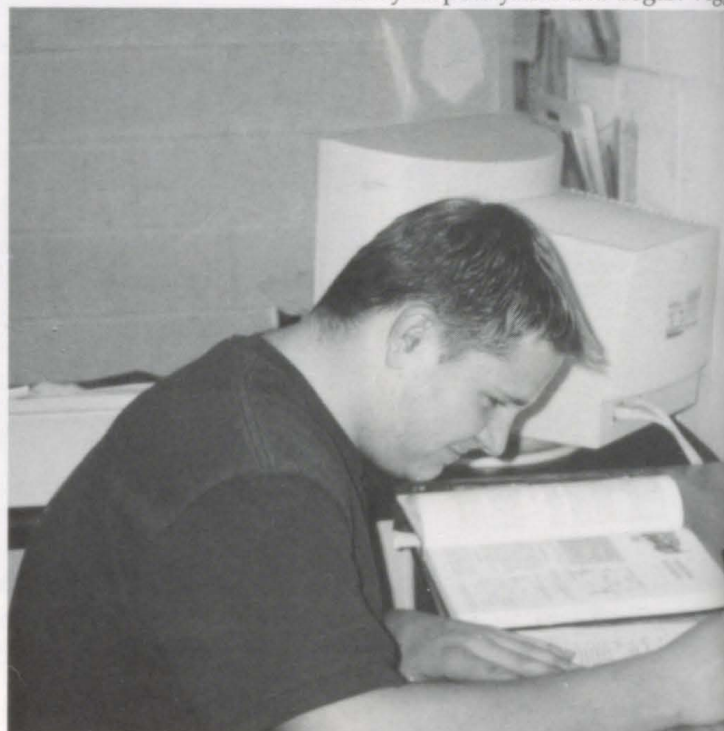

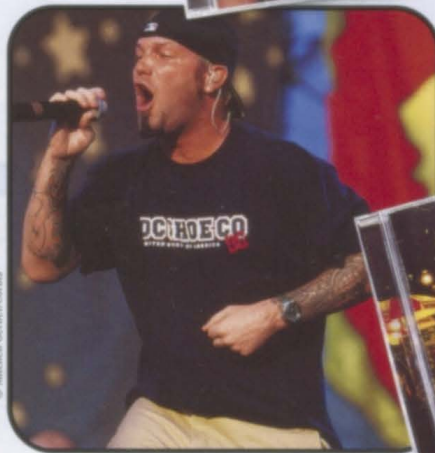

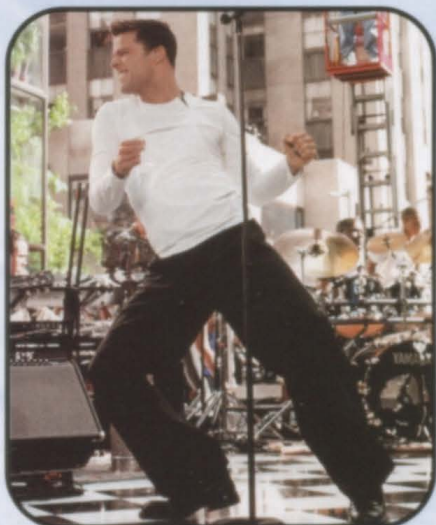

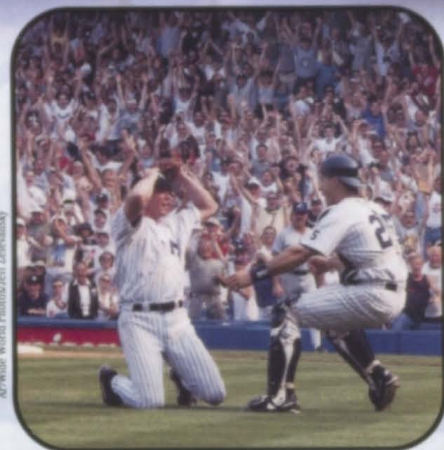

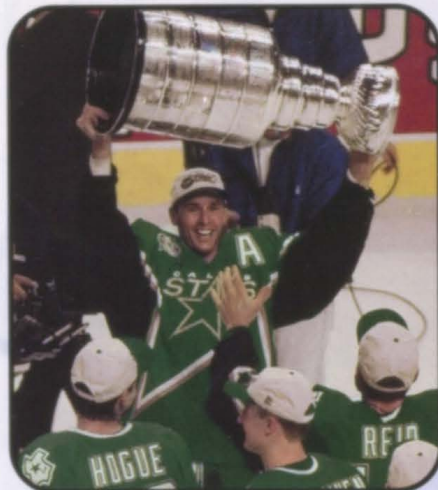

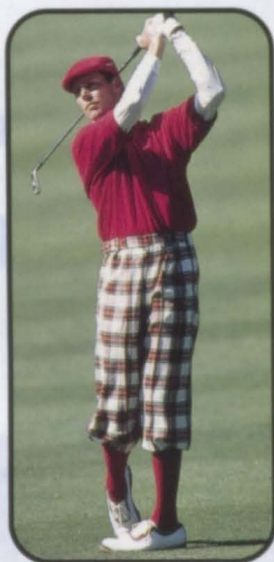

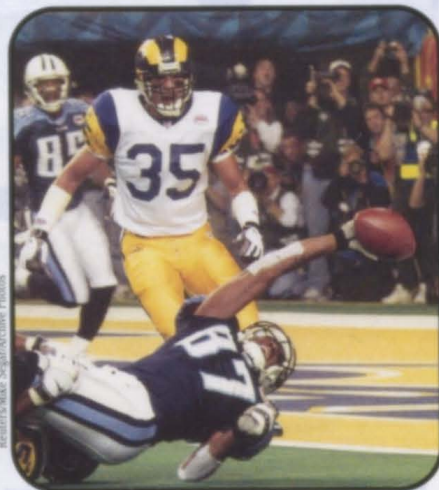

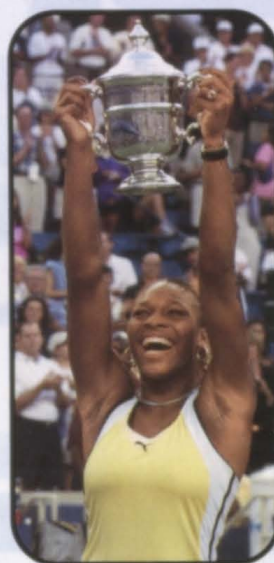

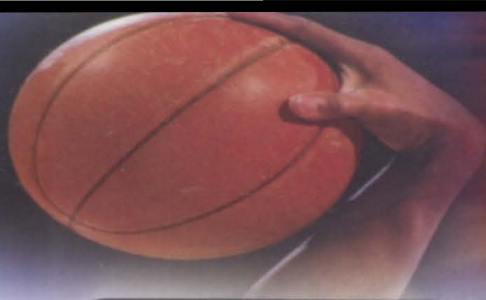
