







Crash Course From SADD

"They painted fake blood on my neck, put blue eye shadow on my lips, and white powder on my face to make it look like I died," said Jamey Justice when she described her preparation for the S.A.D.D. mock accident.

Students Against Driving Drunk presented a simulated car crash on Tuesday, April 29 near the agriculture building to alert Prom goers.

The idea, which was taken from a national S.A.D.D. newsletter, was carried out by the organization along with the Wright City Fire Department, the Warren County Police Department, the Warren County Ambulance District, and the Missouri State Highway Patrol. S.A.D.D. actresses Tara Scoggin, Jamie Johnson, Jamey Justice, Tonya Sydnor, Kim Sutherland, Erica Bopp, and Megan Lagamann

portrayed victims, while Monique LaRocque played the faulty drunk driver.

The accident unfolded in front of the entire student body. Surprised eyes stared as bloody passengers were carefully pulled from the two wrecked vehicles and lifted onto stretchers. While paramedics, policemen, and firemen busied to clear the accident and treat the injured, surprised pupils learned a real life lesson.

"It looked fairly real; it made me think that I do not want to be drunk driving," said Junior Mike Murray.

That is exactly what S.A.D.D. members wanted. Scoggin expressed the seriousness of the dramatization.

"Hopefully, people took it serious enough to realize that this could happen (in a drunk driving accident)," Scoggin commented.

Not only students were involved in the accident, parents were given the opportunity to participate. Cheryl Justice, mother of Jamey Justice, showed her support for the organization by portraying a mourning mother at the accident scene.

"It was a very realistic performance," commented S.A.D.D. member Feather LaRocque, "We were glad that she could help S.A.D.D. out."

The S.A.D.D. mock drunk driving accident was a big success for students and sponsors, Chandra Davis and Stacey Greer. The organization hopes to do more to educate their peers about drunk driving.




"All the trouble was worth the effort because it was a dream to go to a foreign country," Sevara commented.

Phillip says that the school work in Germany is much harder than here in the states. German students have 13 different classes which change day -by -day.










When the blind fold was removed they saw they ate alone. and were being watched by the entire student body.









Peanut butter on pancakes with syrup is an all time favorite of sophomore Damon Tinsley.


"One day, a friend dared me to eat it," he commented.










Soccer Team Has Good Freshmen Player Turnout




Varsity Baseball Team Ends Season With 11 Wins








New Coach And Young Players Bring High Expectations






Junior Varsity Boy's Basketball Team Played A Hard Season






Varsity Boy's Basketball Team Brings Home Three Wins For The Season







Students in Mr. Shaw's class worked on poetry, literature, and grammer. Many other


types of creative writing was done in Shaw's class, too, including papers on "What a Cloud Would See" and daily journals.


"I believe being able to communicate with other people is the most important thing about English," said Shaw.







All of the social studies teachers worked hard to improve the MMAT scores by taking more tests and incorporating them into their regular class work.








Ward said "For science, you have to have a positive attitude to have fun in labs."






Clubs... What are they? Well, they are not the things that cave people used to beat each other over the head with. They are school orientated organizations that bring students together to do something for our school or our community.




