






#### Back-To-School Dance























#### Barnwarming Successful



#### Christmas Dance



#### Prom "78" Rocking And
















GAA

#### Girls Softball






#### New Techniques





### Seventh Grade





















## 1977-78 Yearbook Has Bigger &






# Ir. High Gain Experience

























### New Faces
