WILDCATS TAKE STATE

One of the greatest honors to come to Wright City was the Wright City Wildcats winning the State Class 'S' Basketball Championship, and along with it the Good Sportsmanship Award of the State Tournament. This, of course, speaks well of our players, coaches and fans.

This all began on Feb. 21, at Hannibal, Mo., in the Regional Tournament as the Wildcats took on The Sherwood Day School team from St. Louis. Sherwood Day, one of the smallest schools in the state, was no match for the Wildcats as Wright City got away to a 19-0 lead.

The reserves played the 2nd and 4th quarters, with the final score, Wright City 116 Sherwood Day 39. Scoring honors went to Steve Oberlag with 21 points.

On Wednesday night, Feb. 23, the Wildcats played Williamstown. At the end of the 1st quarter the score was 30-9 in favor of Wright City. The reserves again played the 2nd and 4th quarters. The final score was Wright City 86, Williamstown 60. Scoring honors went to Florence Blanks with 17 points.

On Friday, Feb. 25, the Wildcats met The Providence Prophets from St. Louis, who

TOWN COUNCIL PASSES 2 ORDINANCES

The Wright City Town Council met in regular session March 10 at 7:30 PM. Those present were Mayor Emory Chaney; Aldermen Hutchison, Bueneman, Ambuehl, and Rand; City Attorney McQuey; and City Engineer Thiehaus.

Judges for the election to be held April 5 were appointed and levies to be presented were fixed. The special levies to be voted on are as follows: Street lights, 20¢; Park Fund, 10¢; and Fire Dept., 10¢. The total tax levy for this year will be the same as last year.

Farmers and Merchants Bank was re-appointed as depository for City funds.

Ordinance No. 41 was passed, which provides for the annexation of property to extend the city limits. This ordinance will be presented at a special election to be held concurrent with the regular election, April 5. The proposition to be voted on is as follows:

'Shall consent be given by the legal voters of the City of Wright City, Warren County, Mo., to annexation of certain unincorporated areas of Warren County adjacent to said city as more particularly set out in Ordinance No. 41 of the City of Wright City enacted and approved March 10, 1966, and extension of the corporate limits of said City to include same therein?'

The Circuit Court will hold hearings on this ordinance March 28 at the Court House in Warrenton.

Ordinance No. 42 establishing a Planning Commission for the City of Wright City was passed. This commission is to consist of 7 members, 3 of which will be members of the Town Council, and 4 who will be appointed from non-office holding residents. Names of these members will be announced in the future.

Routine bills were allowed and the meeting was adjourned.

 were figured to be really strong contenders. Wright City, however, started the game with a press that really upset the Prophets. At halftime, the score was Wright City 35, Providence 21. The trend of the game never changed as the final score was Wright City 78, Providence 51. High point man was Tim Cappel with 18 points.

Then came the final game of the regional on Saturday night against Hannibal McCooey, the host school. The Wildcats had their eyes on a victory and that's exactly what they got! At halftime the score was 42 to 19 in favor of Wright City. Greg Nieman had a big night scoring 31 points.

This regional victory sent the Wildcats to the opening round of the state tournament in Kirksville on Feb. 28. This marked the 2nd year in a row that the Wildcats won the regional tournament.

The first game of the State Tournament was against Brunswick, Mo., winner of their regional. Brunswick had a good team, including a 6 foot-6 inch boy, but Wright City handled the situation really well. It was a good game all the way through and the final score was Wright City 77, Brunswick 70. Greg Nieman again came up with 31 big points at a time when the Wildcats really needed them. He was followed by Florence Blanks with 20 points.

The next game was against Cainsville on Wed. night. The Wildcats got off to a very slow start in the 1st half. At halftime, Cainsville was leading 42 to 28. When the Wildcats came out the 2nd half, things were quite different! They employed a really good press and scored 11 points in 1 minute and 27 seconds of

play and stopped Cainsville from getting the ball scross mid-court 5 straight times! Irvin Owens came off the bench and scored 13 points, 10 of them in the last quarter. The final score was Wright City 83, Cainsville 76. Scoring honors for the game went to Florence Blanks with 24 points, followed by Greg Nieman with 17 points.

The Wildcat's next game was Friday afternoon at Brewer Field House in Columbia in the State Semi-Finals. Their opponents were St. Joseph of Farmington, with a record of 26 wins and 7 losses. This was a really close game, and the score at halftime was 26 to 20 in favor of Wright City. It remained close until the closing minutes when the WildCats opened up, making the final score Wright City 62, St. Joseph of Farmington 52. Scoring honors went to Florence Blanks with 18 points, followed by Tim Cappel with 16 points. Florence also pulled down 14 big rebounds.

Then came Saturday night and the final game against Springfield Greenwood, the tournament favorite. The Field House was packed to capacity, and believe me, Wright City fans really turned out to see this game, as they also did on Friday. The game was really close the first half, with the score at halftime being Wright City 18, Greenwood 17. The Wildcats continued to widen the margin and the score at the end of the 3rd quarter was, Wildcats 35 Greenwood 29. With 1 minute remaining in the game, Greenwood had closed to within 2 points to make the score 47-45. The Wildcats scored 8 points in the last minute to make the final score 55 to 45 in favor of the Wright City Wildcats, who are the Class 'S' State Champions of 1966!

The Field Goal Percentage for Wright City was 41%; for Greenwood 29%. Free Throw Percentage: Wright City 64%. Greenwood 53%.

This final game was a

most thrilling experience for the players as well as the fans. It might be interesting to note that some of the former coaches of Wright City High School attended, and followed the team all the way through the State Tournament.

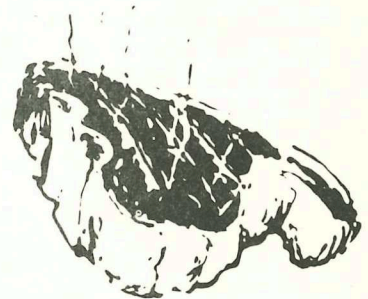

In less than two months, the 'cool rise' method of baking bread has literally swept the nation. Essentially, the cool rise method enables the housewife to prepare her dough, allow it to rise in the refrigerator and bake the bread at her convenience from 2 to 24 hours later. The dough is left in the refrigerator; it is not necessary to bake the bread immediately on its rising. Thus, the housewife can prepare her dough up to 24 hours before she needs the baked bread, insuring hot bread when she does bake it.

BASIC WHITE BREAD

Five and one-half to six and one-half cups regular or instant blending flour

One-half cup warm water, (105 to 115 degrees)

Two packages or cakes yeast, active dry or compressed.

One and three-fourths cups warm milk (105 to 115 degrees)

Two tablespoons sugar

Two tablespoons salt

Three tablespoons margarine

Cooking Oil

Spoon or pour flour into dry measuring cup. Level off and pour measured flour onto wax paper.

Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved.

Add warm milk, sugar, salt, and margarine. Stir in two cups flour. Beat with rotary beater until smooth, about one minute.

Add one cup flour. Beat vigorously with a wooden spoon until smooth. Add enough additional flour to make a soft dough.

Turn out onto a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic about 5 to 10 minutes. Cover with plastic wrap then a towel; let rest for 20 minutes.

Punch down; divide dough in half. With a rolling pin roll each portion into an eight by twelve inch rectangle. Beginning with upper eight-inch edge, roll dough towards you. Seal with thumbs or heel of hand after each complete turn. Seal final seam and edges well.

Place in 2 greased 8 1/2 by 4 1/2 by 2 3/8 inch loaf pans. Brush with oil. Cover pans loosely with oiled wax paper, then top with plastic wrap. Refrigerate 2 to 24 hours.

When ready to bake, remove from refrigerator. Carefully uncover the dough; let stand for 10 minutes at room temperature. Using a greased toothpick puncture any surface bubbles that may have formed on the dough.

Bake at 400 degrees f

Bake at 400 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes, or until done. If desired, brush with melted margarine.

Engraved key chains were presented to the players and appreciation was expressed to all who worked so hard and diligently to bring the Class 'S' Basketball Championship to Wright City.

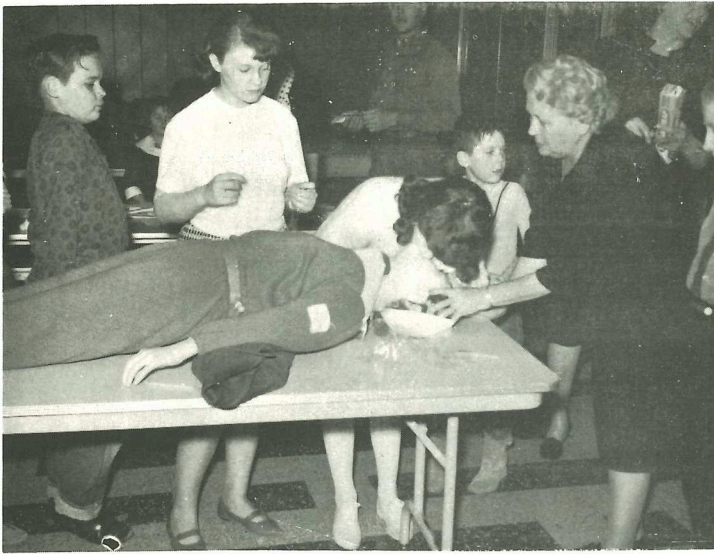
LISA MARIE LYNN

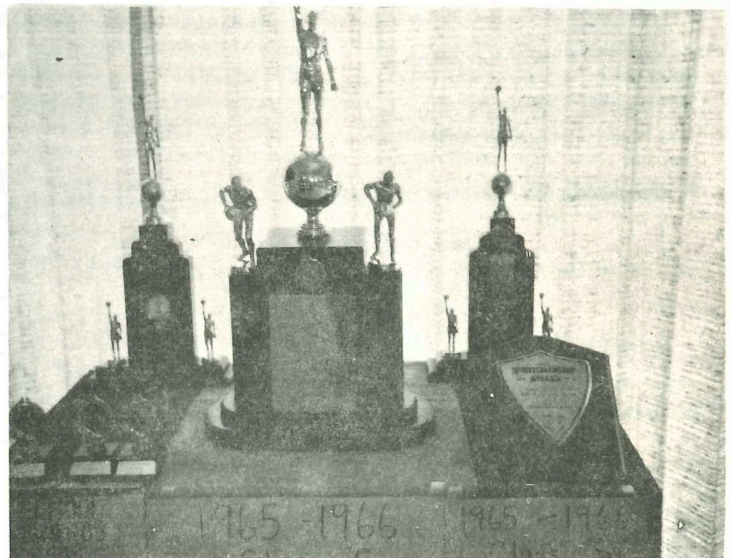
